- 1889 <u>Archduke Crown Prince Rudolf of Austria</u>, heir to the <u>Austro-Hungarian</u> crown, is found dead with his mistress <u>Baroness Mary Vetsera</u> in the <u>Mayerling</u>.
- 1902 The first <u>Anglo-Japanese Alliance</u> is signed in London.
- <u>1908</u> <u>Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi</u> is released from prison by <u>Jan C. Smuts</u> after being tried and sentenced to 2 months in jail earlier in the month.
- 1911 The destroyer <u>USS Terry</u> makes the first <u>airplane</u> rescue at sea saving the life of James McCurdy 10 miles from <u>Havana</u>, <u>Cuba</u>.
- 1911 The Canadian Naval Service becomes the Royal Canadian Navy.
- 1913 The British House of Lords rejects the Irish Home Rule Bill.
- 1925 The Government of <u>Turkey</u> throws <u>Patriarch Constantine VI</u> out of Istanbul.
- 1933 Adolf Hitler is sworn in as Chancellor of Germany.
- <u>1942 World War II</u>: <u>Japanese</u> forces <u>invade</u> the island of <u>Ambon</u> in the <u>Dutch</u> East Indies.
- 1943 World War II: Second day of the <u>Battle of Rennell Island</u>. The <u>USS Chicago</u> is sunk and a U.S. destroyer is heavily damaged by Japanese torpedoes.
- 1944 World War II: The <u>Battle of Cisterna</u>, part of <u>Operation Shingle</u>, begins in central Italy.
- 1944 World War II: American troops land on <u>Majuro</u>.
- 1945 World War II: The <u>Wilhelm Gustloff</u>, overfilled with German <u>refugees</u>, sinks in the <u>Baltic Sea</u> after being <u>torpedoed</u> by a <u>Soviet</u> submarine, leading to the deadliest known maritime disaster, killing approximately 9,500 people.
- 1945 World War II: <u>Raid at Cabanatuan</u>: 126 American Rangers and Filipino resistance fighters liberate over 500 prisoners from the Cabanatuan POW camp.
- 1948 Indian pacifist and leader Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi, known for his non-violent freedom struggle, is assassinated by Nathuram Godse, a Hindu extremist.
- <u>1956</u> American civil rights leader <u>Martin Luther King, Jr.</u>'s home is bombed in retaliation for the <u>Montgomery Bus Boycott</u>.
- 1959 MS Hans Hedtoft, said to be the safest ship afloat and "unsinkable" like the RMS Titanic, strikes an iceberg on her maiden voyage and sinks, killing all 95 aboard.
- 1960 The <u>African National Party</u> is founded in <u>Chad</u>, through the merger of traditionalist parties.
- 1964 Ranger program: Ranger 6 is launched.
- 1964 In a bloodless coup, General <u>Nguyễn Khánh</u> <u>overthrows</u> General <u>Dương</u> <u>Văn Minh</u>'s military junta in <u>South Vietnam</u>.
- <u>1968</u> <u>Vietnam War</u>: <u>Tet Offensive</u> launch by forces of the <u>Viet Cong</u> and North Vietnamese Army against South Vietnam, the United States, and their allies.
- 1969 The Beatles' last public performance, on the roof of Apple Records in London. The impromptu concert is broken up by the police.
- 1971 Carole King's <u>Tapestry</u> album is released to become the longest charting album by a female solo artist and sell 24 million copies worldwide.
- <u>1972</u> <u>Bloody Sunday</u>: <u>British Paratroopers</u> open fire on and kill fourteen unarmed civil rights/anti-internment marchers in <u>Derry</u>, <u>Northern Ireland</u>.
- 1972 Pakistan withdraws from the Commonwealth of Nations.

- 1975 The Monitor National Marine Sanctuary is established as the first United States National Marine Sanctuary.
- 1979 A Varig 707-323C freighter, flown by the same commander as Flight 820, disappears over the Pacific Ocean 30 minutes after taking off from Tokyo.
- <u>1982</u> <u>Richard Skrenta</u> writes the first PC <u>virus</u> code, which is 400 lines long and disguised as an Apple boot program called "Elk Cloner".
- 1989 The American embassy in Kabul, Afghanistan closes.
- 1994 Péter Lékó becomes the youngest chess grandmaster.
- <u>1995</u> Workers from the <u>National Institutes of Health</u> announce the success of clinical trials testing the first preventive treatment for <u>sickle-cell disease</u>.
- 2000 Off the coast of <u>Ivory Coast</u>, <u>Kenya Airways Flight 431</u> crashes into the Atlantic Ocean, killing 169.
