31. Today in History:

- 1710 In the <u>Battle of Helsingborg</u>, 14,000 Danish invaders under <u>Jørgen Rantzau</u> are decisively defeated by an equally sized Swedish force under <u>Magnus Stenbock</u>. This is the last time Swedish and Danish troops meet on Swedish soil.
- 1811 Cry of Asencio, beginning of the Uruguayan War of Independence
- 1827 The <u>Baltimore & Ohio Railroad</u> is incorporated, becoming the first <u>railroad</u> in America offering commercial transportation of both people and freight.
- <u>1838</u> <u>Robert Nelson</u>, leader of the <u>Patriotes</u>, proclaims the independence of <u>Lower Canada</u> (today <u>Quebec</u>)

- <u>1844</u> A gun on <u>USS *Princeton*</u> explodes while the boat is on a <u>Potomac River</u> cruise, killing eight people, including two <u>United States Cabinet</u> members.
- 1849 Regular <u>steamboat</u> service from the west to the east coast of the United States begins with the arrival of the <u>SS California</u> in <u>San Francisco Bay</u>, 4 months 22 days after leaving New York Harbor.
- 1867 Seventy years of Holy See-United States relations are ended by a
 <u>Congressional</u> ban on federal funding of <u>diplomatic</u> <u>envoys</u> to the Vatican and are not restored until <u>January 10</u>, <u>1984</u>.
- 1870 The <u>Bulgarian Exarchate</u> is established by decree of <u>Sultan Abd-ul-Aziz</u> of the Ottoman Empire.
- 1874 One of the longest cases ever heard in an English court ends when the
 defendant is convicted of <u>perjury</u> for <u>attempting to assume the identity</u> of the heir
 to the <u>Tichborne baronetcy</u>.
- 1883 The first <u>vaudeville</u> theater opens in <u>Boston</u>
- 1885 The <u>American Telephone and Telegraph Company</u> is incorporated in <u>New York State</u> as the subsidiary of American Bell Telephone. (American Bell would later merge with its subsidiary.)
- 1893 The <u>USS Indiana</u>, the lead ship of <u>her class</u> and the first <u>battleship</u> in the <u>United States Navy</u> comparable to foreign battleships of the time, is launched.
- 1897 Queen Ranavalona III, the last monarch of Madagascar, is deposed by a French military force.
- 1900 The Second Boer War: The 118-day "Siege of Ladysmith" is lifted.
- 1914 The <u>Autonomous Republic of Northern Epirus</u> is proclaimed in <u>Gjirokastër</u>, by the Greeks living in southern <u>Albania</u>.
- <u>1922</u> The United Kingdom ends its <u>protectorate</u> over <u>Egypt</u> through a <u>Unilateral</u> <u>Declaration of Independence</u>.
- 1925 The <u>Charlevoix-Kamouraska earthquake</u> strikes northeastern North America.
- 1933 <u>Gleichschaltung</u>: The <u>Reichstag Fire Decree</u> is passed in Germany a day after the <u>Reichstag fire</u>.
- 1935 <u>DuPont</u> scientist <u>Wallace Carothers</u> invents <u>nylon</u>.
- <u>1939</u> The erroneous word "<u>dord</u>" is discovered in the <u>Webster's New</u> <u>International Dictionary, Second Edition</u>, prompting an investigation.
- <u>1940 Basketball</u> is <u>televised</u> for the first time (<u>Fordham University</u> vs. the <u>University of Pittsburgh</u> in <u>Madison Square Garden</u>).
- <u>1942</u> The heavy cruiser <u>USS Houston</u> is sunk in the <u>Battle of Sunda Strait</u> with 693 crew members killed, along with <u>HMAS Perth</u> which lost 375 men.
- <u>1947</u> <u>228 massacre</u>: In <u>Taiwan</u>, civil disorder is put down with the loss of an estimated 30,000 civilians.
- 1953 James D. Watson and Francis Crick announce to friends that they have determined the chemical structure of DNA; the formal announcement takes place on April 25 following publication in April's Nature (pub. April 2).
- 1954 The first <u>color television</u> sets using the <u>NTSC</u> standard are offered for sale to the general public.
- 1958 A school bus in <u>Floyd County</u>, <u>Kentucky</u> hits a wrecker truck and plunges down an embankment into the rain-swollen <u>Levisa Fork River</u>. The driver and 26 children die in what remains <u>one of the worst school bus accidents</u> in U.S. history.

- <u>1959</u> <u>Discoverer 1</u>, an American <u>spy satellite</u> that is the first object intended to achieve a <u>polar orbit</u>, is launched. It failed to achieve orbit.
- 1972 Sino-American relations: The United States and People's Republic of China sign the Shanghai Communiqué.
- <u>1975</u> In London an underground train <u>fails to stop</u> at Moorgate terminus station and crashes into the end of the tunnel, killing 43 people.
- 1985 The <u>Provisional Irish Republican Army</u> carries out a <u>mortar attack</u> on the <u>Royal Ulster Constabulary</u> police station at <u>Newry</u>, killing nine officers in the highest loss of life for the RUC on a single day.
- 1991 The first Gulf War ends.
- 1993 <u>Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms</u> agents <u>raid</u> the <u>Branch Davidian</u> church in <u>Waco, Texas</u> with a warrant to arrest the group's leader <u>David Koresh</u>. Four BATF agents and five Davidians die in the initial raid, starting a 51-day standoff.
- 1997 An earthquake in northern Iran is responsible for about 3,000 deaths.
- 1997 The North Hollywood shootout takes place, resulting in the injury of 19 people and the deaths of both perpetrators.
- 1997 <u>GRB 970228</u>, a highly luminous flash of <u>gamma rays</u>, strikes the Earth for 80 seconds, providing early evidence that <u>gamma-ray bursts</u> occur well beyond the <u>Milky Way</u>.
- 1998 First flight of RQ-4 Global Hawk, the first unmanned aerial vehicle certified to file its own flight plans and fly regularly in U.S. civilian airspace.
- 1998 <u>Kosovo War</u>: <u>Serbian</u> police begin the offensive against the <u>Kosovo</u> <u>Liberation Army</u> in <u>Kosovo</u>.
- 2001 The <u>Nisqually Earthquake</u> measuring 6.8 on the <u>Richter Scale</u> hits the Nisqually Valley and the <u>Seattle</u>, <u>Tacoma</u>, and <u>Olympia</u> area of the U.S. state of Washington.
- <u>2002</u> During the <u>religious violence in Gujarat</u>, the 97 people killed in the <u>Naroda</u> Patiya massacre and 69 in Gulbarg Society massacre.
- 2004 Over 1 million <u>Taiwanese</u> participating in the <u>228 Hand-in-Hand Rally</u> form a 500-kilometre (310 mi) long human chain to commemorate the <u>228 Incident in 1947</u>
- 2005 A suicide bombing at a police recruiting centre in Al Hillah, Irag kills 127.
- 2013 Pope Benedict XVI resigns as the pope of the <u>Catholic Church</u> becoming the first pope to do so since 1415.
