- <u>1745</u> <u>War of Austrian Succession</u>: <u>Battle of Fontenoy</u> French forces defeat an <u>Anglo-Dutch-Hanoverian</u> army.
- <u>1792</u> <u>Captain Robert Gray</u> becomes the first documented <u>white person</u> to sail into the <u>Columbia River</u>.

- <u>1924 Mercedes-Benz</u> is formed by <u>Gottlieb Daimler</u> and <u>Karl Benz</u> merging their two companies.

- 1987 In <u>Baltimore, Maryland</u>, the first <u>heart-lung transplant</u> takes place. The surgery is performed by Dr. <u>Bruce Reitz</u> of the <u>Stanford University School of</u> <u>Medicine</u>.
- <u>1995</u> In New York City more than 170 countries decide to extend the <u>Nuclear</u> <u>Nonproliferation Treaty</u> indefinitely and without conditions.

- <u>1997</u> <u>Deep Blue</u>, a <u>chess</u>-playing <u>supercomputer</u>, defeats <u>Garry Kasparov</u> in the <u>last game</u> of the rematch, becoming the first <u>computer</u> to beat a worldchampion chess player in a classic match format.
- <u>1998</u> India conducts <u>three underground atomic tests</u> in <u>Pokhran</u> to include a <u>thermonuclear</u> device.
- <u>2000</u> <u>Second Chechen War</u>: <u>Chechen</u> separatists <u>ambush Russian</u> paramilitary forces in the Republic of <u>Ingushetia</u>.
